Ensure your own safety

Be particularly careful about falling objects.

When you are indoors

When you are outdoors

Avoid moving locations unnecessarily(in principle, for 72 hours)

People moving all at once to the station, etc. can result in dangerous crowding. Stay indoors: If the building (office, school, etc.) is safe, wait there.

Communicate your safety status: Tell family and acquaintances you are safe.

An earthquake has made the building unsafe. There is immediate danger from a large fire.

Move to an evacuation site (Ueno Park area, Yanaka Cemetery grounds, Sumida Park area) Please wait at the evacuation site until a temporary shelter can be opened.

Temporary shelters begin to open in stages

Move to a temporary shelter

Walk from the evacuation site to the assigned temporary shelter.

Once the situation settles down

Return home after public transportation resumes or walk home

Evacuation Centers

(Municipal elementary schools, junior high schools, etc.) Evacuation centers (hinanjo) are opened for the use of local residents.

As a rule, they are not to be used by stranded persons.

Give Priority to Lifesaving Efforts

Large numbers of people trying to return home, etc. after a disaster can block roads. This will prevent police, fire and self-defense vehicles from rescuing lives and protecting property.

Avoid Secondary Harm

Returning home immediately after a disaster is extremely dangerous. For example, aftershocks can cause buildings to collapse or you could be caught in a "crowd crush."

Stay Where It's Safe

When a disaster strikes, it is best to remain where it is safe rather than attempt to go somewhere else.

Be Ready for a Disaster at Any Time

- Individuals should have a method for contacting family or acquaintances in a disaster, as returning home may not be immediately possible.
- Workplaces should have an onsite stockpile of supplies so that people can shelter in place in a disaster.

Temporary Shelters

These facilities will accept stranded people in the event of a major disaster. You can stay at these facilities for up to three days or so.
